January Program, A Call to Action

Wednesday, January 14, 7 pm., Elmhurst Public Library

Our branch will discuss President Jimmy Carter's book *A Call to Action*. This book shares many similarities with *Half the Sky* by Nicholas Kristof and Sheryl WuDunn. Carter's book is more comprehensive but does not have the depth of *Half the Sky*.

Carter discusses the plight of women in third world nations, but he also talks about discrimination in developed countries. He is very aware of the subtle and not so subtle areas of discrimination from the ways countries elect to prosecute prostitution to rape on college campuses to the pay inequality between men and women. He finds fault with all the major religions which interpret their teachings to keep women from reaching equality with men.

A Call to Action reminds us of all that still needs to be done before women and men are truly equal. Jimmy Carter is quick to point out that equality does not currently exist anywhere in the world, a stunning statement.

The following questions are a beginning for this year's book discussion.

- 1. This book shares many similarities to *Half the Sky*; however, the material is presented in very different manners. Which presentation do you prefer? Why?
- 2. The Carter Center (http://www.cartercenter.org/index.html) is mentioned frequently throughout the narrative. Are you familiar with this organization? Would you like to know more?
- 3. A Call to Action introduces many ways in which women are discriminated against. What surprised you the most?
- 4. President Carter states he thinks that many "Right-to-Lifers" should really be called "Right-to-Birthers." Do you agree with this statement? Why or why not?
 - 5. What one statement, fact, or story made you say, "That is so true!"


A wonderful time was had by all at our holiday party. The food was delicious, the company unmatched, the conversation lively! Many thanks to Jan Alexander for hosting.
