On the National Front

ESEA. On January 27 the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions committee held its second hearing about the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), also known as No Child Left Behind (NCLB). The hearing focused on ways to evaluate teachers. AAUW volunteers advocated on Capitol Hill for AAUW's principles regarding ESEA reauthorization, this time on the House side. This week's focus on education coincided with National School Choice Week, which, despite the name, is truly a push for private school vouchers. AAUW opposes voucher schemes as they often involve federal funding for private and religious schools (a clear violation of separation of church and state), exclusion of students with disabilities, and discrimination based on gender, religion, ability, race, and income.

Paid Parental Leave Act. Rep. Carolyn Maloney (D-NY) has reintroduced the AAUW-supported Federal Employees Paid Parental Leave Act, which would make federal employees eligible for six weeks of paid parental leave. Federal workers are currently eligible for only 12 weeks of unpaid parental leave.

Mandatory Reporting Bill for Campus Sexual Assault

A bill has been introduced in the State of Virginia to force public colleges and universities in the state to report allegations of campus sexual assault to the police within 24 hours of notification, regardless of whether the survivor wants to pursue a criminal investigation. Several university officials have spoken against the bill out of concern that mandatory reporting to law enforcement will deter campus sexual assault survivors from coming forward. AAUW opposes mandatory reporting laws. Instead, AAUW seeks changes in how our criminal justice system responds to survivors to make it worth the personal cost of reporting and supports efforts to help communities and schools develop services to not only assist victims but also to aid prevention efforts.

President's Message

I want to share with you the news that Dare to Dream is alive and thriving, even though it is no longer held here in Elmhurst.

On Saturday, January 24, more than 700 Latina girls (from 21 schools), parents, mentors, speakers, volunteers and panelists gathered at College of DuPage for the 7th annual Dare to Dream conference. In fact, turnout was so high that an overflow room had to be set up for the plenary sessions.

Energy was high, too, as the girls and mothers listened to presentations by community leaders, career women and college students, all of them Latinas who had dared to dream.

Keynote speaker was Clarisol Duque, who grew up in Humboldt Park and is now Chicago Director and Chief of Staff to Senator Dick Durbin. Illustrating her personal story with a slide show of her travels and the important people she's met, she showed the girls that success can come from working hard, believing in yourself and daring to dream. Other speakers and panelists included Lourdes Duarte of WGN; Joan Velez of the Elmhurst Police Department; lawyers, doctors, teachers and more.

Our Branch can be very proud of what Dare to Dream has accomplished. Two of our members, Dorothy Valintis and Connie Baker, came up with the idea for D2D after attending the AAUW National Convention in Phoenix and hearing about an AAUW program in California that encourages Latina middle and high school girls to complete their education and introduces them to college and career role models.

Recognizing that the Latino population in our area is growing and that Latina girls are at high risk for dropping out of school, Connie and Dorothy conceived of a program that would target middle schoolers before they were exposed to the distractions of high school and that would include their mothers to ensure that the girls would have family support in pursuing an education instead of dropping out to work or have children at an early age.

Connie and Dorothy worked hard with other Branch members for nearly two years, obtained a grant from AAUW, and enlisted the participation of three other AAUW branches. Dare to Dream: Get Educated debuted in 2009 with 105 girls in attendance at Elmhurst College, and it has grown every year since then.

Over the past years, dozens of our Elmhurst Area Branch members have been involved with Dare to Dream in a multitude of roles. At present Susan Boyd is serving as Vice President, and several others have served on the Board. The Branch and individual members continue to provide financial as well as volunteer support to the conference.

Dare to Dream is such a wonderful example of what AAUW can do. It exemplifies our concern for education and equality of opportunity as well as the energy and dedication of our members. Best of all, Dare to Dream works. For example, at West Leyden High School, of the 22 Latinas who attended the first D2D conference, 20 applied to four year colleges in 2013. Clearly AAUW works, too.
