Julia Morgan: What A Woman!
We imagine that Julia Morgan was an AAUW member. She was well educated (first female to graduate with a Civil Engineering degree from University of California); well traveled (first woman admitted to l'Ecole des Beaux Arts, Paris) and a pioneer in architecture (William Randolph Hearst's castle in San Simeon).

Her time was 1872-1957. Still wondering why she is so highly respected? (Morgan designed over 700 buildings in her lifetime). Then, attend the November meeting to look-see, hear and voice your response to Annette Baldwin's well-rehearsed and impeccable presentation. Perhaps, we will present Morgan with an honorary membership.

About the presenter: **Annette Baldwin's** first-person monologues, PowerPoint discussions and Readers Theater productions have been presented to public libraries, historical societies and museums, professional associations, community organizations and educational institutions in nearly 200 cities across the U.S.

Baldwin's Visual Journeys on architecture, fashion and art are inspired by a past life in fashion promotion for Marshall Field's and Lord & Taylor and as editor at the Chicago American Institute of Architects.

Graduating to a Pay Gap

On October 24, AAUW released its newest research report, *Graduating to a Pay Gap: The Earnings of Women and Men One Year after College Graduation*, showing how the gender pay gap persists and affects the student loan debt burden for women college graduates.

The AAUW report explores the earnings difference between female and male college graduates who are working full time one year after graduation. The finding: in 2009, the most recent year for which data are available, women earned on average, just 82% of what their male peers earned.

Using the latest nationally representative data, the study compares apples to apples by looking at the pay gap after controlling for various factors known to affect earnings, such as occupation, college major, and hours worked. It also examines one immediate effect that the pay gap has on many women: the heavy burden of student loan debt.
