## Half the Sky Group Hits 3-Year Mark

Over the past 3 years, our Half the Sky Interest Group has been meeting monthly. We've covered a variety of topics, read and discussed many books, had programs from various local organizations, and tried new foods at ethnic restaurants.

At each meeting, attendees have the option of donating \$5, and the group determines how these donations will be directed. In the past 3 years, our group has donated over \$2,700 to organizations focused on improving international women's issues. Many of these organizations were highlighted in the <u>Half the Sky</u> book. A significant donation the group made at the end of 2013 was to the Fistula Foundation for \$450, in order to fund a fistula repair surgery for a woman in need.

In December 2013, we increased our funds even more by wrapping books at Barnes and Noble during the holidays. Donations from a few hours of work totaled more than \$300. The group donated the proceeds from this effort to the AAUW **Carolyn Joslin Donovan International Projects Fund**.

Since the group was founded, we have also made 11 microfinance loans via kiva.org (usually in the amount of \$25) to female business owners in a variety of countries. 7 of these loans have been paid back in full (allowing us to loan the money to other women), and 4 of the loans are currently being paid back on schedule.

We're excited that we've been able to learn more about women's issues internationally, and been able to make a difference by donating to many worthy organizations along our journey. We'd love to see you at our next meeting! --Jan Summers

## President's Message

What would Alice Selden say if she could see us now? 75 years after our Branch was founded, we are an active, vital force in our community and in the lives of women and girls across the country and around the world.

Certainly much has changed. We don't wear hats and gloves to meetings, and our newsletter goes out over the Internet instead of with a 1.5 cent stamp. We've moved from needlework and young grads interest groups to Half the Sky and current events, but the Literature/book group remains a constant.

The Branch's stated mission at its founding was "to develop a program enabling college women to continue their own intellectual growth, to further the advancement of women, and to discharge the responsibilities to society of those who have enjoyed the advantages of higher education." That's not so far from where we are today, with our mission-based programming, public policy alerts and activities like Dare to Dream that allow us to be informed and have an impact on the status of women in society. With steadily rebounding membership – we're now 94 strong! – our Branch is well positioned to thrive and make a difference in the local and wider community for another 75 years.

As this year of commemoration and celebration comes to a close, I want especially to express my thanks to Carolyn Heiney, Pat O'Dwyer, Betsy Aldred, Elaine Davison, Janet Hodge, Judy Ekblad, Marcia Goltermann, Tsue Ostermann, Marilyn Thompson, Genie Urick and Mary Eleanor Wall, all members of the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee.

Carolyn began the process of planning for our celebration, chaired the committee, and spent countless hours making arrangements with Butterfield Country Club, writing a press release, designing the invitation, preparing the program booklet, and no doubt doing dozens of other tasks I don't even know about. She also organized the "AAUW Stories" that were recorded in January.

Pat O'Dwyer set up our Branch meeting at the Elmhurst Historical Society, and with Janet Hodge and Genie Urick spent hours in the EHM library reviewing Branch scrapbooks and other materials we had donated in order to record the highlights of our history. Pat took the information gleaned and created several detailed documents that record the development of the Branch. One of them is posted on our web site under "About Us," and another will be at your places in the form of a scroll at our luncheon on May 3. Pat's work has helped us appreciate the inspiring history of our Branch and the work of those who went before us.

Betsy Aldred arranged for a mayoral proclamation that will be read at our luncheon. Judy Ekblad is rolling and tying history scrolls as I write. Marcia Goltermann was our link to the beautiful Butterfield Country Club, which is not open to the general public. Genie Urick produced the two Branch appearances on cable television and DVDs that highlighted our history: the Elmhurst, Our Kind of Town program about the Branch with Mary Eleanor Wall, Marcia Goltermann, Susan Szymanski and me last summer, and the AAUW Stories mentioned above.

Everyone contributed to the many planning sessions, creation of guest lists, mailing of invitations, gathering of materials for our display case at the Library (special thanks to Sally Schuster for her display design skills!) and all the other little tasks that went into celebrating our history and sharing our story with the community.

On behalf of AAUW, I am delighted to recognize the AAUW Elmhurst Area Branch on its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Our records show that the Elmhurst Area Branch was established January 1939. We applaud your exceptional service and demonstrated commitment to education and equity for women and girls. Please accept this certificate of honor as a small token of our gratitude.

Because of your many efforts and hard work, AAUW continues to grow with more than 170,000 members and supporters nationwide. Our shared commitment to empowering women and girls translates into positive change at the local, state, national, and global levels.

Thanks to you, we've been able to make these advances for women and girls in 2012-13:

- AAUW has provided more than \$4.3 million in fellowships and grants for 278 outstanding women and nonprofit organizations in the 2012–13 academic year.
- Our Legal Advocacy Fund supported seven new lawsuits, including military sexual assault cases and a pay discrimination suit against Wal-Mart.
- Together we mobilized the It's My Vote: I Will Be Heard voter education and turnout campaign and challenged millennial women to make sure their voices were heard. And they were: Women were 53 percent of the electorate nationwide, and voters ages 18–29 made up 19 percent of the national turnout.
- AAUW's research report, *Graduating to a Pay Gap*, explored the salary disparity between women and men one year after college graduation. The report was featured by dozens of media outlets, including Reuters, U.S. News and World Report, and the Washington Post.

We are proud of these accomplishments that you helped make possible. These efforts remind us why we are passionate members of AAUW — but we will not stop here. As women gain access to educational and economic opportunities, we must keep up our efforts to further their progress. As an AAUW member, you belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so that all women have a fair chance.

Congratulations again on the AAUW Elmhurst Area Branch's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary! We appreciate all the hard work and activism your branch has accomplished and look forward to your continued support in the coming years.
