Good food...better conversation, our year begins with the September Supper. This supper is a casual way to catch up with members and meet new ones. Our president, Sarah Caltvedt, will say a few words, but the focus of the evening is enjoying a great meal and seeing everyone again.

This year we have a private room at Francesca's Amici, 174 North York Road, Elmhurst. Francesca's worked with us to give us a wonderful meal at a great price: \$28 per person including tax and gratuity. Dinner begins with **Insalata della Casa**, a fresh salad of romaine lettuce, carrot, cucumber, and tomato with balsamic vinaigrette. The main course follows: **Rigatoni con Mozzarella** (rigatoni pasta sauteed with tomato basil sauce and fresh mozzarella) and **Pollo alla Romano** (roasted chicken breast with garlic, shallots, rosemary, lemon, olive oil, and roasted potatoes). We will have **Profiteroles** for dessert. Coffee, hot or iced tea, and water are included. There will be a cash bar for all other beverages.

If you have special dietary needs, please let us know when you make your reservation.

HER STORY THEATER’s mission, through theater and the written word, is to shine bright lights in dark places on women and children in need of social justice and community support.

Her Story Theater’s SHADOW TOWN II: THE JOHNS, written and directed by Mary Bonnett, is a 90 minute original stage play, based on Mary’s dozens of interviews of people involved with sex trafficking in Chicago. Meet Baby Girl and The Family.

SHADOW TOWN II: THE JOHNS picks up where SHADOW TOWN left off...with the ‘Demand’ side of sex trafficking, the men who buy young girls for sex. The play explores how it impacts the men’s lives, their families, the girls they use and the community.

The play is imaginative, amusing, powerful and must-see production. It is woven with song, a little dance, untraditional in style yet moving in presentation and important piece of theater.

Proceeds benefit The DREAMCATCHER FOUNDATION, a street rescue and recovery organization for Chicago sex trafficked girls and women. The DREAMCATCHER FOUNDATION is developing a crisis drop-in center in the Chicagoland area for sex trafficked girls and prostituted women.

Running Time 90 minutes no intermission.

Did You Know . . .

- 97% of the buyers are men
- The average age of a sex trafficked child is 11 years old.
- Sex trafficking is a \$32 billion dollar illegal business, the second largest in the world.
- Once a child is trafficked, their survival rate is 7 years.
- *Did you know there are 16,000 children in our city, suburbs and collar counties sexually exploited in the commercial sex trade
- Sex trafficked children live in a nightmare, 365 days a year.
- Did you know, together we help end it.

Will she be encouraged and enabled to pursue any course of study or employment that interests her? Will it be easier to balance work and home life when she grows up?

The answers to these questions are in our hands, and as members of AAUW we can take a stand and continue the fight to achieve equity for women. Let's make sure Lily and all of our daughters and granddaughters have the bright future they deserve.

Used Book Sale 2014

We've done it again! Our 55th annual Used Book Sale was a resounding success. For five weeks an incredible group of dedicated sorters turned out to sort and organize the thousands of books that were donated by the community. As the saying goes, "Many hands make light work."

New members Denise Dean, Betty LaLiberte, Deb Markello, and Maria Patt got a chance to meet other Branch members as they joined in the sorting and sale. Our helpers Elyse Willis and Matthew Niewiara retrieved books from our collection barrels and private homes, and many people just showed up at Lincoln School with carloads of books. Many times we arrived in the morning thinking that we'd never get through all the boxes and bags that had accumulated, but we almost always did.

Lauren Pittelli did an amazing job of getting our smiling faces (and sale information) in the newspaper throughout the summer. Marga Breckenfelder hand delivered flyers to promote the Book Sale to over 70 Elmhurst establishments. Cynthia Smith-Jans, Perry Doubt and Pat O'Dwyer handled signage and numerous other details. Sandy Burk managed the finances and bank deposits. Carolyn Heiney assisted in managing the sale and stepped in when a funeral and grandmother duties called me away.

The weather gods cooperated by giving us unseasonably cool weather that compensated for the lack of air conditioning. And in the end, all the hard work paid off. Our gross income was \$12,727.90 from book sales, \$420 from Discover Books for the items they picked up after the sale, and \$800 from admissions and scanners Thursday night. The \$800 will go into our Convention Fund to help defray the cost of AAUW convention and conference attendance, and the remainder, minus expenses, will be available for AAUW contributions and local scholarships as determined by our AAUW Funds Committee and ratified by the Branch membership in November.

The annual Used Book Sale is our signature event in the Elmhurst community. It gives us priceless visibility, but also provides an important service. Residents can donate their books knowing that they will be put to good use; people can buy books at very affordable prices; anything left over is donated to local charities like the VA Hospital and the Yorkfield Food Pantry or picked up by Discover Books to be donated elsewhere, sold to cover expenses, or recycled properly; the money raised funds AAUW's important work as well as local scholarships; we get an opportunity to promote membership. Best of all, working on the sale gives us a chance to talk, share books, get to know each other better, and that, in turn, leads to a stronger Branch. This year we feel very strong indeed!

Speak Out About Sexual Violence on U.S. Campuses

In the next few weeks, thousands of students are returning to college – you can help make sure that preventing campus sexual violence is part of the back-to-school conversation. Use AAUW's online "Two-Minute Activist Tool" to submit a letter to the editor (LTE) to your local paper.

Your letter can tell students and others about the epidemic of campus sexual violence and steps we all can take to reduce it.

Around 1 in 5 women are targets of attempted or completed sexual assault while they are college students, as well as about 1 in 16 college men. At least one report found that college-aged women are four times more likely than any other age group to face sexual assault.

These numbers tell us one thing: What's happening on our campuses is unacceptable.
