It's My Vote: I Will Be Heard

The millennial woman is bright, educated, and part of the first generation to have had computers available from birth. She is 18 to 30 years of age and she is very, very busy!

So, the program chairs consider it a privilege that five millennial women will speak at our October meeting. Following the 2012 Public Policy mission to register 18 to 30-year-old women for the presidential election, we asked our five panelists to conduct a mini-research project using social media. They agreed to ask their peers three questions: 1) Are you voting in the upcoming presidential election? 2) Why are you voting or why are you not voting in the upcoming presidential election? 3) What issues or topics should the next president resolve?

The answers to these questions will reveal a great deal about the voting habits and attitudes of young women today. Most important is that AAUW members know and understand what inspires 18 to 30-year-old women to participate in the voting process. Members of the panel are:

Carolyn's Corner

What's the Status of the Used Book Sale for Next Year?

The news is wonderful! Plans are underway for another used book sale at Conrad Fischer School. Some of you have heard or even asked the questions. Will we be able to continue the sale with the increased facility District 205 use costs? Are we receiving enough used books with the introduction of Kindles, and Nooks, and iPads to make our sale worthwhile for another year? Do we have enough buyers willing to purchase books?

Yes, yes, and yes. While all of these questions are relevant, the most important one this summer was the rental fee for the Conrad Fischer gym. After meeting with District 205 officials, I can report that we will be able to pay the reasonable rental fees.

Our branch board looked at ways that we could make changes that would require less contact time and thus fewer hours of air conditioning the gym. We examined the number of members who sort at certain times and plan to reduce the number of sorting times to two per week. Based on our experience last year, we also will reduce the number of weeks that we actually sort before the sale. This should be a doable plan with your support.

While the number of books that we received this year was down, our profits weren't. We feel that we can continue the sale for another year. We are not ignoring the fact that the increased use of technology may at some point force us to look for a different fundraiser; however, this should not affect the sale for 2013.

It is true that this year we had fewer dealers and booksellers on our opening night; however, the number of shoppers throughout the sale was steady. We sold many, many books, enough to make the sale a "Go" for next year. Save those used books!

This election season, countless get-out-the-vote campaigns will sweep across the United States to convince Americans to register and vote this November — including the AAUW Action Fund's It's My Vote: I Will Be Heard campaign.

It's My Vote is focused on educating, engaging, and registering millennial women voters by emphasizing how things like equal pay, student debt, and birth control access affect women. These voter mobilization efforts might have different tactics, but what they want is the same — to express the importance of each and every vote.

As much as voter mobilization efforts accomplish, they will never succeed in catching every potential voter. I know this because I work for one of these campaigns. Don't get me wrong — the work we do is wonderful. I am filled with pride every time I hear about a successful voter registration drive or see a video of a young woman telling her personal story of what voting means to her.

But we — you and I, as individuals — can fill in the gaps missed by get-out-the-vote efforts. If you believe, like I do, that democracy is the best form of government we've yet sustained, then it should also be important to you that everyone in your life votes. I mean everyone — from your 86-year-old grandmother to your 18-year-old brother, who spends most of his day playing video games.

No matter how insignificant our actions and our votes may seem, it will take everyone's effort if we ever hope to reach that "more perfect Union."

Like thousands of men and women who came before me, I believe in democracy. I believe in it enough to drag you to the polls — no matter who you are or who you vote for. So on November 6, take responsibility for more than one vote, and get as many folks as possible to cast their ballots.
