## Hairy Who?: Imagist Art Collection

Elmhurst College Library Art Curator and original Imagist artist **Suellen Rocca** will conduct a tour of Elmhurst College's acclaimed collection.

The highly creative and irreverent Imagist art movement which emerged in Chicago in the 1950's and 60's was one of the first major art movements to give women an equal role.

The critics ("Hairy Who" and there is a story there) were not overly fond of the works these artists were creating.

Today Imagist work can be found in art museums and important collections throughout the world.

"The (Elmhurst College) collection represents what art critic James Yood called 'the best single overview of art from 1966 to 1985 in any public institution.'"

On October 10<sup>th</sup>, **AAUW-IL** is holding a conference for the northern half of the state in Schaumburg. Some of our Board will be attending with me. Anyone from our Branch may attend; cost is \$15. If interested, please contact me.

I recently attended a Public Policy event sponsored by AAUW, this one by Cindy Grau, entitled "Why Redistricting Matters in Changing Illinois". I brought back some petitions to sign so that we can get this nonpartisan initiative on the ballot, to try to make Illinois electoral districts more logical and properly representative. We must have better redistricting to make our democracy work!

And our branch is co-sponsoring another Public Policy event on September 29<sup>th</sup>, "Illinois Power Woman", with **Illinois Senator Christine Radogno**, who will speak on women's issues in Illinois, including the ratification of the ERA. As I spend time with my little granddaughter, I sometimes think about how far we've come, yet how far we have to go. Still no real policy on maternity leave, no support for working parents with child care or other benefits, still a significant wage gap; and the list goes on...

Our branch's leadership team continues to grow, helping us focus on the mission. **Denise Dean** is our Public Policy Director, **Susan Szymaski** will be our advocate on International and Diversity issues, **Betty Laliberte** is facilitating our Half the Sky study group, **Leslie Stipe** will lend support on STEM issues and **Jennifer Aldred-Barry** will focus on Title IX issues. We are still in need of someone to help us with Policy and Bylaws, making sure we're aligned with national and state policy changes. If you'd like to nominate someone, please contact me.

We've had a great start to our year, and I'm anticipating a great year ahead of us; strengthening our community, enjoying our programs and making a difference for women and girls!

## How Women Affect the Outcome of Elections - October 10, 2015

On Saturday, October 10<sup>th</sup>, former Congresswoman Judy Biggert, Illinois State Representative Kathy Willis, and Ms. Sedy Soto, Congresswoman Tammy Duckworth's district director, will address the Lombard Area Branch of AAUW, informing us how we can engage more women in the electoral process, whether it's running a winning campaign, raising funds for women candidates, running for office yourself, or electing candidates who support issues that affect the lives of women and girls.

Our panel participants bring their years of experience in political party campaigns to our discussion of how women affect the outcome of elections. This is a unique opportunity to hear from women on both sides of the political aisle, and to see how the elective process works for women in national as well as statewide elections.
