February Meeting Date: February 8, 2017 7:00 pm
Location: Elmhurst Public Library, Kossman Meeting Room
Speaker: Lauren DeSimone, Family Shelter Service

The mission of Family Shelter Service in Wheaton is – “Transforming lives by offering help and hope to those affected by domestic violence.” Our February Meeting program will be presented by Lauren DeSimone, Annual Giving Coordinator.

Domestic violence is a very difficult and complex community issue that affects not only the victim, but also the victim’s family. It affects us all. Lauren will define domestic abuse and violence and describe how Family Shelter Service helps those affected by this prevalent crime as well as the services the agency offers to victims and community members. The presentation will also include information on how we can help make a difference and be an advocate for victims in need in our own communities.

Additionally, we are grateful that our member and producer for Elmhurst Community Programs, Genie Urick, has arranged for this program to be videotaped for broadcast in March by Elmhurst Cable TV. This will mean that the important information given us by the speaker will reach a much wider audience than that in our meeting room.

Speak Up – Fight Back

Maybe you saw it in the news. Dathan Paterno a member of the Park Ridge-Niles School District 64 resigned over derogatory comments he made on Twitter in which he described participants in the Women’s March as “vagina screechers”. Members of a Park Ridge women’s group fought back, posting their views on Social Media. Their posts went viral and soon there were stories in the press and on TV. Because of her connections to the Park Ridge women’s group, Cindy Grau was one of four women interviewed by CBS Channel 2 about the controversy (see <http://chicago.cbslocal.com/2017/01/23/park-ridge-residents-angry-after-board-members-controversial-tweets/>).

A psychologist by profession, Dr. Paterno wrote in one tweet “Alas, the 300 million pound Women March provides a strong argument for doing away with women’s suffrage.” Another called the marchers a “hysterical horde of half-wits.” Paterno submitted his resignation on the morning that the School Board was scheduled to meet.

President's Message

2017 is off to a great start! Our Branch kicked off a great line-up of programs in support of our mission in January, with more to come. And the efforts of many in AAUW in support of the Women's Marches across the country have me revved up.

Many of our members braved the cold in January and attended our monthly program presented by Susan Tripi DeLano, Executive Director of Re:New: Creating Hope for Women. In her presentation we learned how this non-profit in Glen Ellyn teaches refugee women skills and provides them with part-time work. The Q&A session was quite lively, discussing the challenges that refugees, especially women, have in finding a job and building a future here. We also discussed the refugee screening process, which is very arduous. So a place like Re:New is so important to them assimilating well. At our program there were examples of the women's work and everyone is welcome to visit their studio and store in Glen Ellyn to view more.

On February 8th, our program will focus on the issue of domestic violence against women and children. The Family Shelter Service, located in Wheaton, will be the presenter. While this is a difficult subject, it's one we should better understand to support these women and children and to make all of us safer.

For me the best day in January was the Women's March. I went to Chicago along with Denise Dean to join the protest and I know other members were there as well. Some of my AAUW friends were in other cities, including D.C. It was a glorious, warm, and sunny day here in Chicago. Spirits were high in the crowd, which was much larger than expected. Reading all the protest signs was inspiring and often comical. Everyone was friendly and the sense of camaraderie was amazing. Although the originally planned route was blocked due to too many people, we "marched" back to the train station, chanting and laughing. Even the train ride home was full of marchers and the party continued. I loved the energy and enthusiasm and the solidarity. Women's Rights are Human Rights! Everyone there believed it and was committed to resisting any loss of our rights. Now it's time for more action!

If you have an issue that is in danger, speak up, ask for support from this community, get involved. Check out the app Countable to keep up on the issues in Congress. Read the emails from AAUW National on Washington Update. Be an AAUW Two-Minute Activist when the email comes in. Send letters or postcards to your elected officials. Call or email or stop by their offices. **Don't keep quiet.** Remember the suffragettes who started this journey for us. We need to keep it going! We *will* continue in 2017 to strive to succeed in our mission of impacting gender equity, making a difference for women and girls.
