### ***In Her Own Right: Marion Mahony Griffin***

**Elmhurst History Museum • 7:00 pm**

On Wednesday, March 8, at 7 pm, our meeting will take place at the Elmhurst History Museum, 120 E. Park Avenue, Elmhurst, where we will enjoy a private tour of the current exhibit, "In Her Own Right: Marion Mahony Griffin." And, who is Marion Mahony Griffin?

Many of us as Elmhurst residents are familiar with architect Walter Burley Griffin; but few of us know that his wife, artist and architect Marion Mahony Griffin, was the backbone of the Prairie School of Architecture. Her beautiful, detailed, uncredited renderings are those we associate with many of Frank Lloyd Wright's most famous buildings.

Griffin deserves recognition in her own right as the second woman to graduate from MIT with a degree in architecture and the first woman registered to practice architecture in Illinois. We will have the pleasure of learning about and exploring this amazing biographical exhibit with **Lance Tawzer**, Elmhurst History Museum's Curator of Exhibits.

The museum will be open just for our branch meeting that evening. It will be a unique event in that our group will be able to view the exhibit and learn, interface and converse with the curator. Please plan on attending.

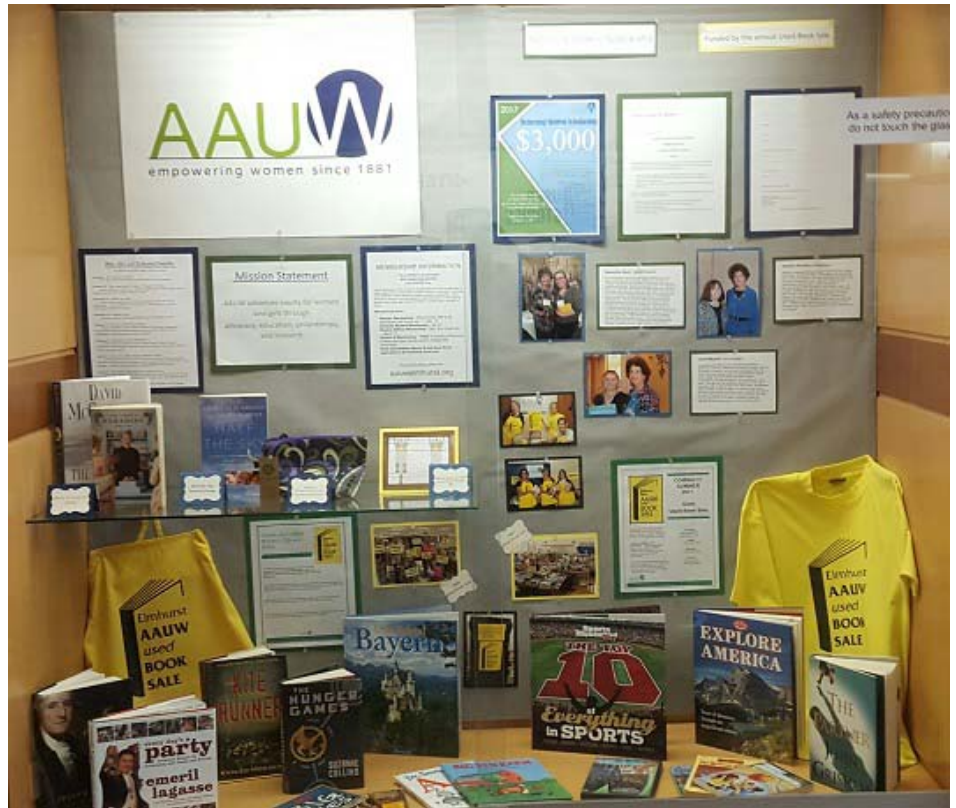

## President's Message

2017 is off to a great start! Two great programs in a row! And the weather has been great for February. I'm looking forward to both continuing.

Our February program focused on the issue of domestic violence against women and children. The Family Shelter Service, located in Wheaton, provided an informative presentation, including a speaker who had lived the process of dealing with and escaping the violence. The presentation was recorded and can be seen on local television. And the Q & A session afterwards was lengthy, informative, and inspiring. We need to understand the issues so that we can also support friends and family who may need help.

Next month we will meet at the Elmhurst Historical Museum for a private tour of the exhibit on artist and architect **Marion Mahony Griffin**. This is also "invite a friend" month, so please think of someone who may find our programs and community of interesting women enjoyable, and bring her along. This is an excellent exhibit about one of the first woman architects, definitely a trailblazer, helping to break down gender stereotypes.

Gender stereotypes are one of my pet peeves. Not only that they exist without real evidence, but that they also contribute to our sense of identity. I have several children and grandchildren but I see the two littlest ones frequently, so they are my recent test case. Although we have come a long way in many respects, it's still amazing how our culture promotes certain colors and different toys and images for girls versus boys. The almost-three-year-old girl is smart and very articulate. But the focus from many in the extended family is on the princess theme and being pretty.

Now the 9-month-old boy is getting bigger and more active, he's getting trucks and cars and building things. Both parents are working to minimize the princess role model for their daughter, but it's everywhere, in movies, stores, and commercials. My granddaughter picked up on the fact that I wasn't keen on Sleeping Beauty and asked me why I didn't like her, even though she did. I told her it's not that I dislike her, just that she doesn't do anything but sleep. She thought about it and agreed some of the newer movie characters were better, more active. So, Sleeping Beauty got shelved. We're evolving, but it takes effort to prevent the slide backwards.

And there are lots of concerns on losing ground in today's political climate. It's sometimes tough to determine the issues on which to focus. Whatever issue is important to you, whether it's to continue improving or to not lose ground, follow that issue and keep in contact with legislators as necessary. Speak up, ask for support from this community, get involved. Send letters or postcards to your elected officials. Call or email or stop by their offices. **Don't keep quiet.**

We need to stay strong and resist efforts to hold us back. We **will** continue in 2017 to strive to succeed in our mission of impacting gender equity, making a difference for women and girls.

## **Start Smart/Work Smart Interested in Becoming an AAUW Salary Negotiation Facilitator?**

If so, then sign up for an AAUW online workshop and learn to help teach women how to negotiate their salaries, and help close the gender pay gap, which for Illinois women overall in 2016 is at 79.2%.

Learn how to get involved by watching the Start Smart/Work Smart video, and then sign up for a training webinar (which is free for AAUW members). The webinar provides information about the gender pay gap, and guides you through the importance of negotiation skills, presentation methods, as well as collaboration, facilitation and speaking skills. Afterward, you can maintain your certification by conducting one workshop as a facilitator and attending one refresher webinar each year.
