Branch Members Approve Distribution of Book Sale Funds

At the Branch Business Meeting on November 8, AAUW members approved the Funds Committee and Board Members' recommendations for the distribution of the proceeds from the Book Sale:

- \$7,000 to be sent to AAUW National's **AAUW Fund**. What is the AAUW Fund? Unrestricted gifts that make it possible for AAUW to respond quickly to new or unforeseen challenges facing women and girls, to leverage and innovate mission-based opportunities, and to attract new audiences by enabling us to expand our programs.

- \$6,000 to be allocated for two (2) - \$3,000 Returning Scholar scholarships. The selection of the scholarship recipients will be conducted in April, 2017 by the Funds Committee.

- \$1,000 to Dare to Dream to fund an alumna's scholarship for college.

The Funds Committee will be meeting shortly to again prepare and then carry out a plan to promote the Returning Scholar Scholarship Program. We're open to new ideas and ways to enhance our Branch's past promotional efforts. Our efforts last year netted 18 applications. Give me or anyone on the Funds Committee a call with your suggestions. All ideas are welcome.

President's Message

November was an interesting month for me. I usually love November as it's my birthday month, and I love the long Thanksgiving holiday weekend. It was a great one this year for me, with lots of family and friends in several celebrations with food, wine, and fun. Also during this time, several events collided to remind me of the issues we as women still face.

On the positive note: at our Branch Meeting in November, we confirmed the Board's approval of the AAUW Funds recommendation for distribution of the Book Sale proceeds. We will again have a \$1,000 Scholarship for a Dare to Dream alumna, and this year we will have two (2) Returning Scholar awards of \$3,000 each. As this was made possible by our very successful Used Book Sale, we are making our national contribution in honor of our Used Book Sale Committee. Our donation to AAUW will be \$7,000, specifically to the AAUW Fund, which supports our AAUW mission to advance equity for women and girls through **advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research**.

Our planned November program was focused on some of that AAUW research - **Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership**. Unfortunately, our speaker from the AAUW-IL Gender Equity Fund cancelled that morning as she was ill. Our program team scrambled and were able to retrieve the slides and notes, so I could present the slides and generate some discussion on the planned program topic. Although I'm sure the practiced speaker would have done a more professional presentation, we salvaged the meeting and had some interesting discussion. That focus on the presentation issues had a real impact on me as the topics raised by the presentation really got into my head.

I encourage everyone to read this research online or borrow our Branch's copy of **Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership**. We as women need to be the change, to ensure we minimize our own implicit bias, so that we can enable more women to be leaders. I am heartened by the number of women running for office now. For example, in the Virginia state legislature, 11 *diverse* women unseated white men in the 15 seats that changed. Wow!

And of course, all the news about various celebrities, politicians, and powerful men, who have been finally exposed for their abuses, ranging from verbal harassment, to groping, to sexual assault. All of it crosses the line, but some are so bad and long-standing, it's depressing that it took so long for these women to be heard. Yet, I've already heard even some women blaming the victims. Ughh! We've got to look inside ourselves and stand up for other women, always!

In January, we will dig even a little deeper into the misogyny and sexism we face, including the legal issues we have as women. We will watch the documentary [Equal Means Equal](#), and will discuss key points afterwards, facilitated by Denise Dean and me. As this is a packed program, we will start at 6:30 pm. Please bring any feminist friends with you.

In December we will have our Holiday Party at Janet Hodge's home. I hope to see you there. If I don't get a chance to see you, I wish you Happy Holidays and a Happy New Year.

With more than three dozen films by prominent independent filmmakers, Women and Girls Lead is carving out an important space in media for stories that usually go unheard.

Women and Girls Lead collaborates with a broad range of partners in the media, nongovernmental organizations, and public television to really engage audiences with the content. Film clips, games, curricula, and discussion questions are just some of the tools provided to help strengthen the campaign and bring attention to the issues.

Ultimately the goal is to, through this public awareness and education, promote leadership development, violence prevention, and economic empowerment of women across the globe."
