Hacking the Vote in Illinois

Midterm elections are less than 90 days away but the security of the Illinois voting system remains an important issue according to the Illinois Ballot Integrity Project. In August 2016, "amid an FBI warning to Illinois state election officials to tighten election security, the Illinois State Board of Elections said...they believe personal information...was hacked through a cyberattack of possible foreign origin." (Source: CBS-Chicago). The "possible foreign origin" refers to the knowledge that foreign servers were used but it couldn't be determined conclusively that foreign actors committed the cyberattack.

Requests for Illinois Mail Application voting begins August 8 and Illinois Early Voting starts September 27 so what do voters concerned about hacking do?

Melissa Urdu, co-director of IL Ballot Integrity, and my trainer as a precinct committeeman recommend that to hack-proof your vote, you need to:

1) Vote ON election Day. Use a paper ballot. Touch screen voting machines are extremely vulnerable to hacking, and they do not provide a paper trail making a recount impossible.

2) OR, request a Vote by Mail application by calling the Election Commission at 630-407-5600 between August 8 and November 1. Vote by Mail ballots can be mailed out starting September 27.

BOTTOM LINE: VOTE BY PAPER.

AAUW Issues Statement on Kavanaugh Appointment

WASHINGTON — AAUW Chief Executive Officer Kimberly Churches released the following statement announcing AAUW's opposition to the confirmation of Judge Brett Kavanaugh to the U.S. Supreme Court:

“AAUW's expectation is that our next Supreme Court justice will support the fundamental rights of all individuals and understand that his or her decisions have a very real impact on the daily lives of women and their families. After careful review of Judge Brett Kavanaugh's available record, it is clear to us that he would not be that justice. Judge Kavanaugh's record shows that he is willing to do grave harm by undermining positions central to AAUW's mission, including upending employment and labor rights, opposing reproductive rights and access to health care, entangling public education and religion, and restricting voting rights. The Supreme Court is the arbiter of so many of the rights essential to women and girls, and if confirmed Judge Kavanaugh will have a say in those decisions for decades to come. Therefore, AAUW opposes Judge Kavanaugh's confirmation to the Supreme Court.

On the specifics of his available record, Judge Kavanaugh confirmation would put women's constitutional rights, including abortion, at risk. He has shown opposition to women's access to reproductive health care and contraception, seeking to delay a woman's access to an abortion, arguing in support of religious employers who obstruct their employees' access to contraceptive coverage, and calling into question protections of the Affordable Care Act.

Judge Kavanaugh has shown little support for workers' rights, including low-wage workers and workers of color. While on the bench, Judge Kavanaugh argued to weaken protections for race and age discrimination, as well as to narrow prohibitions against retaliation. He routinely argued to limit workers' rights to organize and to narrow the scope of our nation's labor laws. He has consistently sided with employers and against workers, refusing to support those who seek to improve workplace conditions and to protect those who have experienced discrimination.

While we continue to urge that Judge Kavanaugh's full record be released to the American public, his available record makes clear that he stands in opposition to the values and mission of AAUW. He is the wrong choice for the Supreme Court and for women and girls. Now more than ever we need a Supreme Court justice who is not beholden to ideology and will be an independent voice. The role the next justice will play in all of our lives is too important for anything less.”

AAUW urges members to call on their Senators to oppose Judge Kavanaugh's appointment, stating, “Let us be clear: this is an issue of policy, not party. AAUW advocates for the health, education, and economic security of all women and girls. Judge Kavanaugh has demonstrated hostility to women's right to access abortion; shown little support for workers' rights; failed to support contraceptive healthcare coverage; argued against long-standing precedent prohibiting the use of public funds for religious activities; and has a record of limiting access to the ballot box. If confirmed, Judge Kavanaugh will have a say in women's constitutional and civil rights for decades to come. We cannot support a nominee who will not uphold and protect our fundamental rights.”

Shape the Future Membership Drive

Have you ever heard of Shape The Future and wondered what it is all about? Shape the Future events are those at which we offer a reduced membership fee. We have offered Shape The Future at two of our regular Wednesday programs that were cosponsored by the library as well as at the book sale.

Basically how it goes is this: The prospective member attends one of our programs and receives an application form from either Suzanne, me or from our table display. They have an indicated time frame in which to submit their completed application and payment. Payment is equal to half the current National and branch dues plus full state dues. Currently this amount is \$49.00.

For every two new members we get via Shape The Future we get one membership with dues waived by National and our branch. State dues which are presently \$10.00 must still be paid.

We are very happy to announce that we have four new members due to our event during the book sale!

Celebrating our 80th Anniversary

In celebration of our Branch's 80 years (1948–2018) this monthly column will feature highlights of our AAUW members who made countless contributions to the Elmhurst Community. Their complete biographies can be read in the book First Ladies of Elmhurst: Prominent Women of the 20th Century Authors: Ruth Strand & Genie Urick

Florence Elizabeth (Bliss) Aldred

In 1995 Mayor Thomas Marcucci proclaimed *Florence "Betsy" Aldred Day* in Elmhurst. Betsy was presented the 45th Elmhurst Jaycee Distinguished Service Award for her lifetime of outstanding volunteer work. In 1973 she had organized the first DuPage County Equal Rights Amendment march in the Lombard Lilac Parade. She also marched in the Springfield ERA Rally.

Betsy served as YWCA Board of Directors Chair, Girl Scout Leader, Secretary of Elmhurst's People Party, Hawthorne School PTA officer, Sandburg PTA President, St. Peter's United Church of Christ Women's Guild Treasurer, and President of the West Suburban Republic Women.

In 1997 Betsy ran for First Ward Alderman - a position she held for 16 years! In 1985 she became the first Elmhurst woman to run for Mayor. As 3-term Elmhurst Historical Society President, she initiated the first Historical Housewalk in 1986. Betsy was elected our AAUW Branch President in 1995 after serving in many offices.

She initiated the very first Recycling Program in 1972 – which consisted of Betsy & fellow AAUW members standing in front of the Elmhurst Post Office next to a dumpster on Saturdays. As cars pulled up they handed their tin cans and newspapers to Betsy & friends! As a wife, mother, speech therapist and activist, Betsy once said, "You can get a lot of work done if you don't care who gets the credit."

Flashbacks: Branch Historical Facts

1938 -- Elmhurst Branch is chartered with 58 members — the 36th branch in Illinois. The first meeting takes place on Nov. 20, 1938. Alice Shepherd (Mrs. Carlyle).

1942 -- In March 1943 the Branch opens the Children's Exchange Shop as a community service project to meet wartime shortages of nursery and children's equipment, furniture, toys and clothing during WWII. After two years of successful operation, it is sold and the profits (\$1,896) are donated to the community.
