## DuPage Pads -- What They Do and Who They Support

Scott Austgen, VP, Programs at DuPage Pads will discuss the various programs offered by DuPage Pads as well as the clients they support at the AAUW meeting on October 9.

DuPagePads is so much more than a pad on the floor. DuPagePads is about the journey home. It's about the journey from dependency to self-sufficiency. Not the shelter. Not the nights spent in a car, in a motel room or on the street. DuPagePads is a journey that begins with an extended hand, an affirming voice, and a trusting soul that will advocate undividedly for each individual.

The solution to end homelessness is more complex than providing individuals with food and shelter. Founded in 1985, DuPagePads is the largest provider of interim and permanent housing, coupled with support services in order to help individuals work toward becoming self-sufficient. These vital support services enable individuals to receive case management and life coaching, employment support such as job coaching, as well as engagement with employers—effectively stopping the cycle of homelessness. DuPagePads IS the solution to end homelessness—because when someone believes in you, everything can change.

## Women and Violence in Chicago

According to the 2019 Report on the Status of Chicago's Women and Girls, the key indicators of gender equity are unpaid care work, female-headed households, teen pregnancy, and violence against women. Of these, violence against Chicago women, especially women of color, remains "alarmingly high." In 2017 (latest date for final analyses) there were,

111 reported instances of rape per 100,000 people

10 reported cases of human trafficking

61 female victims of homicide

19 violent crimes against women per day

To understand violence against women in Chicago, we need to put it in the larger context of all violent crime in Chicago which is not as the political media presents it.

There exists a strong myth that Chicago is the "U.S. Murder Capitol" or the "Most Dangerous City in the U.S." Here are the facts:

Media sources frequently compare Chicago to its slightly larger coastal competitors, Los Angeles and New York City. NYC, in particular, has an enviable low murder rate but both cities have less murder and violent crime rates than Chicago.\* This leaves Chicago in the spotlight with the highest absolute total killings per year because Chicago has so many people. If we look at murder rates as the FBI and other responsible agencies do, Chicago is nowhere near the nation's worst. In fact, in rankings of the world's most dangerous cities, Chicago does not even make the top 50 list whereas St. Louis (15th worst in the world!), Baltimore (23rd worst), Detroit (46th worst), and New Orleans (50th worst) do.

Narrowing our lens to U.S. cities, the data also shows again that Chicago clearly does not deserve its reputation. The FBI Uniform Crime Reports 2017 is the best source and many organizations use its data for their reports. One report focusing on the 100 most populous U.S. cities reports that 15 cities have higher total violent crime rates than Chicago.\*\* Violent crime includes rape (Chicago ranks 34th), robbery (Chicago ranks 7th), aggravated assault (Chicago ranks 21st), and the headliner murder (Chicago ranks 10th).

If the report using FBI data focuses on all U.S. cities of a certain population size, say 250,000, Chicago looks even better: 24th out of 30 in one report or 25th out of 100 in another. Or, if you want to make Chicago look totally safe: the Swedish Nomad site (admittedly no data source given!) doesn't even include Chicago in its 25 Most Dangerous U.S. cities list!

Despite the slight differences in rankings, we can safely conclude that Chicago's reputation is being seriously tarnished by a media out-of-touch with reality. This is not to say that Chicago doesn't have a violent crime problem that especially affects women and minorities – most U.S. cities have the same issue. However I, like Melinda Gates, like to look at the data when considering public policy issues and possible remedies. Maybe U.S. cities can spend more time learning from cities with lower violent crime rates (another M. Gates strategy – looking at examples where things work well).

\*These rates are for gun homicides only. Non-gun homicides for the 3 cities are effectively equal.

\*\*For the curious, besides the 4 cities mentioned above, the U.S. cities with higher murder or violent crime rates than Chicago are Kansas City, Newark, Memphis, Cleveland, Philadelphia, Milwaukee, San Bernardino, and Indianapolis (order varies depending on source).
