Madeleine Albright first entered politics in 1972. She took on many important positions and became the first female Secretary of State in 1996. Albright quickly lived up to her reputation as a strong-willed and outspoken problem-solver, engaging with a broad range of issues.

Based on Albright's memoir, *Read My Pins: Stories from a Diplomat's Jewel Box*, our speaker, retired gemologist Marti Tracy, follows Albright's diplomatic life through her collection of brooches which ranged from dime-store pins to designer creations and family heirlooms. Beginning with her time on the UN Security Council, she wore brooches to express her moods and opinions; the pins were a way to deliver a visual message. Join us to learn more about this fascinating woman.

Used Book Sale Funds Distribution Proposal

Once again, our book sale reaped great rewards. After expenses, our net profit was \$15,514. At our October Board meeting, the board proposed to distribute the profit from the book sale as listed below. Our branch bylaws state that we send 60% of the net to the AAUW Funds at National to promote the mission of AAUW. The remaining 40% will be used for local scholarships.

The Board recommends that we divide the book sale profits as follows:

- AAUW Funds National donation at \$9,300
- 2 returning scholarships at \$2,500 each
- 1 Dare to Dream scholarship at \$1,000

Members will vote on this recommendation at the November meeting.
