STEM Stuff

New Research

From the November 2019 journal, Science of Learning on nature.com, come interesting results from two studies discussing gender brain similarities and differences in STEM learning, which attempt to address concerns with the underrepresentation of women in STEM fields. Here are brief overviews of those studies, and links to the full journal articles.

First: In the gender similarities in the brain during mathematics development study, which employs the first fMRI (functional MRI) research in early childhood math cognition, findings indicate that we begin with NO biological neural processing gender difference. Previous behavioral studies have also failed to detect gender differences for basic math learning at this point. Apparently, we are more the same than different.

These are great indicators that the old tale of girls not being as good as boys in math is a fallacy – at least early on, as the research was performed on children ages 3 to 10. Take advantage of free access to the journal article at <u>https://rdcu.be/bZxeF</u>. The first couple of pages are an easy read.

Second: Utilizing self-reported questionnaires and neuroimaging, researchers reported in sex differences in brain correlates of STEM anxiety, however, cultural and sociological pressure on female college students result in greater levels of STEM anxiety than males during some STEM courses. While both female and male students have to deal with the academic challenges of competition with their classmates, heavy lab schedules, and/or fear of advanced science and math courses, stereotyping, gender-based bias, and the absence of female role models provide additional anxiety for the female students.

New Illinois Laws for 2020

Illinois has more than 250 laws that will go into effect January 1, 2020. Here are a few of the ones that align with AAUW priorities:

HB 3550 - Consent in Sexual Activity

Sex education instruction in grades 6 through 12 will now be required to include an age-appropriate discussion of the meaning of consent. This includes teaching that consent is a freely given agreement to sexual activity, that consent to one activity does not include consent to others, that a person's clothing, past activity, lack of resistance and more do not constitute consent, that a person can withdraw consent at any time, and that a person cannot consent to sexual activity if the person is unable to understand due to incapacitation from drugs and alcohol, being asleep or unconscious, having a mental disability or being a minor.

SB 1507 – Revenge Pornography

The Civil Remedies for Nonconsensual Dissemination of Private Sexual Images Act allows victims of revenge porn to recover damages (economic, emotional distress, punitive and more) in the two years after an image is disseminated or threat to disseminate is made.

HB 2135 – No Time Limitations for Criminal Sexual Assault Prosecution

This new law removes the statute of limitations for criminal sexual assault, aggravated criminal sexual assault and aggravated criminal sexual abuse for all ages, not just minors. Previously, prosecution could only be brought within 10 years of the offense and only if the victim reported it to law enforcement within three years.

HB 3498 – No Time Limitations for Female Genital Mutilation Under 18

This measure removes the statute of limitations for female genital mutilation for victims under 18, meaning the crime can be prosecuted at any time. It also makes female genital mutilation done by a parent or guardian a Class X felony.
