Public Policy Report

Biggest July news: On July 17, the state of Mississippi formally asked the U.S. Supreme Court to reverse its landmark abortion decision, Roe v Wade (1972) and the court agreed to hear the case. Previously, in May 2021, Mississippi had merely asked the court to roll back some limits on abortion that had been cemented by Roe v Wade. The top court will hear the case (Dobbs v Jackson Women's Health Organization) in its term beginning in October and a decision is likely to come by June of 2022.

This case will be the first major abortion dispute to test all three of former President Trump's appointees to the top court including its newest member, Justice Amy Coney Barrett.

August 3, 2021: Black Women's Equal Pay Day: It takes the typical Black woman 19 months to be paid what the average white man makes in 12 months, leading to an almost \$1 million wage gap loss for Black women.

Good News: After a three-year battle with Oregon State University, Anne Devan-Song, an AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund recipient, had her case settled in early summer. All disciplinary sanctions against Devon-Song were removed and she was reinstated as a PhD candidate in good standing. She had faced sexual and gender-based harassment from a fellow student and was disciplined and suspended when she tried to report it. She believes that speaking out about inequities and "non-punitive, iterative" examination of policies are the best methods for progress. Oregon State University has changed its Student Code of Conduct to make it more difficult for OSU to punish people for talking about their experiences of discrimination at OSU and advocating for equity, justice, and inclusion.

Our loyal group of sorters worked 6 days a week from 9-12, members filled every shift to sell, our clean-up crew of members and spouses made quick work of clean-up, and our teenage workers picked up books, carried books, cut down boxes, and transported our cardboard to recycle bins.

One of our members, Jane Kiep, donated her extensive library to the cause. There had to be more than 1,000 beautiful books! We so appreciate Jane's generosity!

While many individual members toiled tirelessly, we need to thank the committee. Their help with planning and decision making was so very important. Thanks to Perry Doubt, Moira Murray, Cynthia Smith-Jans, Jennifer Jordan, Suzanne Stock, Jan Caudy, Deb Markelo, Judy Ekblad, Jane Jegerski, Pat O'Dwyer and Darlene Van Meir.

Of course, we couldn't have done it without the community. If they had not donated their bags and boxes of books and media, we wouldn't have had a sale. The Elmhurst Public Library allowed us to place our collection bin in their alcove, and Courts Plus once again offered us collection space. The Sandburg custodial staff and principal were valuable partners, as was Pam Knighton at the District #205 office. Dee Longfellow at the Elmhurst Independent gave us tremendous coverage in our local newspaper. A former member, Denise Dean, guided us with pricing those special books, and Doti Liquors saved us tons of boxes to hold our treasures. The crowning jewel at the end was the York football team who made quick work of recycling the books, breaking down and recycling the boxes, and taking down tables. All accomplished in record time. Thanks to all of you for your support! Our gross receipts totaled over \$20,000. That includes \$930 of entrance fees from the first night and \$261.25 of donations.
