Half the Sky

Our 2020-21 research into the challenges for women and children in the Northern Triangle of Central America [Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador] has brought us in a full circle back to Chicago. Our study group has been reading about women-lead charities assisting women and children in country and as immigrants.

Our action component has yielded generous contributions to the Chicago based Interfaith Community for Detained Immigrants. ICDI member Pat Motto explained the workings of ICDI to our group in the summer of 2020. In 2021 our Half the Sky group chose to team with ICDI to assist immigrants traveling via bus through the Chicago. We have provided over 44 wallets each with \$20 to the ICDI efforts. We have provided over 250 snack bags to give immigrants traveling through Chicago some healthy foods. How much fun it has been to deliver the snack bags to ICDI.

In this time of Covid, we have reached out to connect with those in need. Sometimes connections are physical hugs and handshakes. During this year of Covid, our connections with food and some funds take the place of hugs and handshakes connecting us with others.

In keeping with the idea of coming full circle in our education about immigrants, we are now back in Elmhurst. In April, Mr. Lorenzo Rubio, chair of the World Language Department spoke with us about the immigrant student population at York High School. In the last nine years the Guatemalan population has grown from 3 students to over 60 students. Mr. Rubio spoke about the needs of these students, some coming here with families and some unaccompanied. The demands placed upon these students are so much more than academic. Here in Elmhurst many organizations are working together to assist those who struggle. Members of our Half the Sky group are part of the Elmhurst Resource Collaborative. We hope to keep learning and working with them in the near future.

President's Message - May 2021

This past week, I was able to get my second dose of the Pfizer vaccine – hooray for science! I'm already feeling more optimistic about what the summer might bring, including some in-person gatherings with friends, like our June 12 branch lunch, and perhaps a branch book sale.

The state convention took place via Zoom April 23 and 24, with some excellent presentations:

- •Michelle Duster, great-granddaughter of Ida B. Wells reviewed the highlights of her great-grandmother's life and legacy. I did not realize that Ida had run for Illinois state senate in 1930 just 10 years after white women received the right to vote. She was a trailblazer and it gives me pause to reflect on the civil rights issues that we are still grappling with over a century later.
- •Kimberly Stratton, aerospace engineer working at Caterpillar what a role model for young girls interested in STEM. It was so uplifting to hear her story and the work she's doing to encourage today's youth to pursue careers in engineering.
- •Dr. Gretchen Goldman, Union of Concerned Scientists reminded us of the challenges that working mothers of young children have faced throughout the pandemic. There is much work to be done to regain ground lost this past year for women, especially women of color. Women's participation in the workforce has not been this low since 1988.
- •Gloria Blackwell, AAUW gave an update on the National organization, including updated Work Smart education efforts, and a pilot program for college women regarding financial literacy, among other initiatives focused on moving women forward. She let us know that there will soon be an updated membership portal on the website, which will replace the outdated Member Services Database that we've been using.

Our branch ranked 8th among Illinois branches last year, donating \$4,285 to AAUW Funds. While that figure is lower than prior years, it's still an accomplishment given we were unable to hold our summer book sale.

A final reminder to vote in the AAUW national election before the May 17 deadline. In the last election (2017), only 12% of Illinois AAUW members voted – which is quite frankly, an embarrassment. Let's do our best to make sure the percentage is higher this time around.

I hope to see you for our next branch program on May 12 at 7 pm via Zoom, during which we'll be exploring Gender Bias with the help of resources from the toolkit on the national website – see details elsewhere in this newsletter.

Open Membership Bylaws Amendment

There are two more weeks left for us to cast our ballots in the National Election. Voting ends on May 17, 2021. One of the important issues on the ballot is the Open Membership Bylaws Amendment which proposes the elimination of the degree requirement for membership.

This is a significant change in the AAUW Bylaws. Your Elmhurst Area Branch Board of Directors is unanimously in favor of approval of the Open Membership Bylaws Amendment and encourages us to vote to approve the amendment.

The following is explanatory and supporting information from the AAUW National website, <u>www.</u> aauw.org/membership.

- •The reasons we should drop the education requirement are simply: [1] Because it is the right thing to do; [2] Because it is in keeping with our mission to advance gender equity.
- •Simply put, this is about inclusion. AAUW's vision is Equity for All. Our membership practices should align with this vision.
- •The educational requirement is counterproductive to recruiting diverse members as well as younger members.
- •There are many paths to education beyond colleges and universities. As important as the P-12 and four-year college system is, education comes in many forms, including Career Technical Education, on-the-job training, and similar education routes.
- •Those who do not have degrees can be strong advocates for our mission.
- •We are an organization that promotes equity, yet we do not treat non-degree individuals as equal. This is simply unacceptable.
- •Times have changed. Younger feminists care about our mission but don't join us because they see us as an exclusionary or elitist organization, one that hasn't evolved into modern thinking about equity and inclusion.
- •Corporations and foundations prefer to work with and/or fund organizations that adhere to their diversity, inclusion, and equity policies and practices. We lose out on dollars that could help us move forward with our mission and vision which puts a bigger burden on our members to contribute to AAUW.

(Mostly) Maternal Health Bills in the Illinois General Assembly This Spring

Menstrual Equity Bills:

•The Homeless Act (HB310) – feminine hygiene products available at all homeless shelters

•School Buildings (HB156) – feminine hygiene products available at no cost in every school building

•SNAP Benefits (HB155) – menstrual hygiene products can be purchased under SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), WIC (Women, Infant, and Children program), and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program

•Higher Education (HB641) – menstrual hygiene products available at no cost in each public University and community college

Planning a Pregnancy

•HB135 – Allows for pharmacists to dispense hormonal contraceptives/birth control

•HB3995 – Allows for the establishment and licenses for birth centers (important in rural areas where travel to full hospital services is too far and urban/rural areas facing a shortage/closing of full service hospitals)

•HB 3709 – Allows for infertility coverage for same sex couples; gives the LGBTQ community the same kind of insurance coverage that is given to cross sex couples

Ensuring Equitable Restrooms in Businesses

•HB3195 – Amends the Equitable Restrooms Act and allows for businesses that would like to install unisex bathrooms the ability to do so. It is a may and not a shall.

Protecting the Safety of Abortion Providers

•HB3990 – Amends the Reproductive Health Act to shield the personal information of abortion providers from the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests.

Decriminalizing HIV – removes the stigma/penalties that people living with HIV face for their everyday actions, e.g. being prosecuted for consensual sex, donating blood
