Another Record Breaking Used Book Sale

Thanks to the contributions of so many members of our branch, we are able to report that we had another record breaking used book sale this summer!

We grossed \$22,265 and are expecting about \$900 later this fall from the book recycler that took away the books that were not sold by the end of the sale. The book sale last summer (2021) had been the highest grossing book sale previously, collecting about \$20,460, and it was a surprise to surpass that. Of course, we still need to pay our final expenses (the largest of which are to the school district and our high school helpers) before the Funds Committee can meet to determine how best to apportion the funds to scholarships and national AAUW, but we are gratified with the proceeds.

During the book sale, we were able to offer a Shape the Future promotion, which allows new members to join at a reduced rate for one year. The great news there is that we had 7 members join! 5 are brand new to AAUW and 2 are rejoining after a number of years' break. Hopefully we'll be able to meet them in person at the September supper or one of our fall programs at the library.

While we did have support from people outside our organization, such as school district personnel and the York football team members, Carolyn and I are most indebted to the branch members that helped with the sale.

Whether you donated books, worked on publicity, collected boxes, helped at the sale itself, or sorted one day (or every day!) – we thank you! Without your efforts the book sale would not have been the success that it was.

Branch Fiscal Year End Update

Our branch fiscal year ended on June 30. Financially, it was a positive year for our branch. We received more in donations than we have in prior years, most likely due to the fact that we are now a not-for-profit organization and all donations are tax deductible. We retained our membership numbers.

Because many of our programs were held via zoom, we saved on our program budget. And last summer's book sale was very successful, allowing us to make a substantial donation to the national AAUW organization as well as to award 4 local scholarships.

Overall, the branch spent about \$2,000 more than it received in income during the last fiscal year. This was intentional, as money had built up in some of our funds and we felt it would be better to give the money out in the form of scholarships than to continue to retain the funds.

At the end of the fiscal year (06/30/22), the branch had healthy balances in all three of its funds, with a total of \$13,491 in the bank:

Funds Committee Report

The AAUW Funds Committee will meet in September to begin discussing the allocation of the funds earned from our successful book sale. Last year the \$10,109.49 designated as the amount to send to our National Organization was divided evenly between two funds—the Greatest Needs Fund and the Education and Training for Women Fund. These funds and others are described on the AAUW website.

The Greatest Needs Fund allows AAUW to respond rapidly, in our communications and advocacy, to critical issues affecting women as they emerge – whether it's a new threat to Title IX, an opportunity to partner with employers, or the dawn of a social justice movement like #MeToo. When donations are not restricted to fellowships or specific projects, AAUW National has the dollars to pivot as the national dialogue shifts – and get our work covered by major media outlets such as the New York Times, CNN, and Fortune.

The Greatest Needs Fund is also what fuels AAUW's groundbreaking research and effective advocacy to work to pass fair-pay laws and other key equity legislation.

The Education and Training Fund addresses the barriers that prevent women from thriving in school and pursuing the careers of their dreams. That means championing equal access to education and ensuring women can learn in environments free from harassment and discrimination.

The Economic Security Fund promotes women's livelihoods through advocacy for fair-pay, legislation, researching the pay gap, training women to negotiate for the salaries they deserve, and advising employers on fostering fair cultures.

The Leadership Fund supports AAUW's work to bolster the number of women in top roles across all industries by addressing systematic biases and giving women skills and resources they need to lead.

The Governance and Sustainability Fund enables AAUW to function as effectively and efficiently as possible—following the latest best practices for hiring and governance and incorporating state-of-the-art technology into our member database and other systems.

In the coming months, the Funds Committee will be recommending to the Branch for your approval how to allocate the 2022 Book Sale Funds.


To learn more about this notion of privilege, here' are excerpts from Professor Richard Guzman's great blog on this topic (https://richardrguzman.com/peggy-mcintoshs-invisible-knapsack/):

- 6. When I am told about our national heritage or about "civilization," I am shown that people of my color made it what it is.
- 8. If I want to, I can be pretty sure of finding a publisher for this piece on white privilege.
- 12. I can swear, or dress in second-hand clothes, or not answer letters, without having people attribute these choices to the bad morals, the poverty or the illiteracy of my race.
- 14. I can do well in a challenging situation without being called a credit to my race.
- 19. If a traffic cop pulls me over or if the IRS audits my tax return, I can be sure I haven't been singled out because of my race.
- 23. I can choose public accommodation without fearing that people of my race cannot get in or will be mistreated in the places I have chosen.
- 26. I can choose blemish cover or bandages in "flesh" color and have them more or less match my skin.

In October, the DEI Study Group will read <u>American Like Me: Reflections on Life Between Cultures</u>, the book edited by America Ferrara and featuring essays from Lin Manuel Miranda, Roxane Gay, Michelle Kwan, Kal Penn, and many others. In November, we will attend the Elmhurst Public Library co-sponsored book discussion of <u>American Like Me:</u> at the Elmhurst Historical Museum.
