How the Dignity Index Can Improve Relationships

People in the U.S. are exhausted from years of political and social high conflict and crave a way out of the polarized climate. The Connections group of the Batavia, Geneva, St Charles Branch of AAUW has considered several possible solutions and, in 2023, began focusing on the Dignity Index.

The Dignity Index is a process of coding civil discourse with a goal of changing how we communicate with each other. Developed and promoted by the national organization UNITE, the Dignity Index is an eight-point scale that rates speech from most contemptuous to most dignified. Research sponsored by UNITE has shown that by pointing a spotlight on contempt, we get more dignity and less contempt. Dignified speech then leads to better communication between individuals and groups and increases the opportunities for compromise.

Connections members Rosie McVay, Maureen Brandon, Chris Bruun and Pat Hendrix will lead the group in understanding and applying the Dignity Index. We will practice rating quotes and changing speech to make it more dignified.

We often complain about the divisions in our society, work place, and family. Come join your fellow AAUW members on Wednesday, November 6th, to learn the skills we can use to perhaps change the conversation.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Members:

I received an AAUW Newsletter from Gloria Blackwell (CEO) at the end of last month. I would like to share some of this article and some other important information with you.

"As fall brings cooler air and vibrant foliage, I am reminded of the work that lies ahead with the upcoming election and beyond.

This season, we face a troubling setback: unfortunately, the gender pay gap has widened. Women working full-time now earn just 83% of what men earn— a decline from last year's 84%. This amounts to a loss of \$11,550 annually for each full-time working woman. While there have been gains in real earnings for both men and women, women, especially women of color, continue to be pushed into lower wage jobs.

"This pay gap hurts us, our families, and our communities. As I've said before, "The pay gap should be shrinking, not growing." We must address the systemic barriers that keep women from earning their fair share — like the lack of paid leave, affordable childcare, and strong pay equity laws."

As we move forward this fall, let's channel our collective energy. Whether it's by joining <u>Two-Minute Activist</u>, voting for candidates that support women's issues, or standing up against injustice wherever you can, each of us has a role to play in creating a more equitable world.

Thank you for your unwavering commitment to AAUW's mission. Together, we will continue pushing for equity and opportunities for all women."

FUNDS COMMITTEE REPORT

The AAUW Funds Committee met on 10/14/2024 to draft a proposal for disbursement of funds earned at the 2024 Book Sale.

Members of the committee, Josephine Mulvihill, Director; Moira Murray, President; Jennifer Jordan, Director of Finance and Fundraising Chair; Judy Ekbald, Former Director of AAUW Funds; Susan Pingitore, Publicity; Renee Oshinski, (absent), Co-Chair Fundraising.

The Used Book Sale raised \$18,648.95 after expenses. Maintaining the 50/50 ratio between National and Local that was approved 3 years ago by branch members, \$9,500.00 will be sent to National, with \$9,324.00 to be retained for branch scholarships.

The following recommendations are hereby proposed by the Funds Committee. They were endorsed by the Board of Directors on October 30,2024 and will be presented for a vote by the membership branch on November 6, 2024.

Proposed:

- 1. Lower age to 23 years old for returning student scholarships
- 2. Offer 3 &4,500.00 returning student scholarships and 2 \$1,000.00 scholarships for Dare to Dream
- 3. Donate \$9,500.00 to AAUW National for Greater Needs Fund

Once the donation to National and all scholarships are deducted the Fundraiser account will be \$1,721.74, an amount sufficient for the 2025 Book Sale start up.

During our 2024-25 year, Half the Sky would like to support the ICDI Illinois Community for Displaced Immigrants' request for household supplies. We will have a hamper at the entrance door of our monthly general meeting. If you are interested in supporting these efforts, please feel free to add an item or two to the collection. ICDI is looking for these items to assist families as they set up households with essential supplies.

Cleaning Supplies:

All-Purpose Cleaners - disinfectants, glass cleaner, floor cleaners

Cleaning Tools - microfiber cloths, sponges and scrubbers, mops, buckets, brooms and dustpans

Restrooms Supplies - toilet bowl cleaner, hand soap, paper towels, and toilet paper

Kitchen Supplies - dish soap, trash bags, dishcloths and scrub brushes

Personal Hygiene Items:

Personal Care Items - tooth brush, deodorant, toothpaste, dental floss, shampoo, conditioner, body wash/soap, razor, saving cream

Helping Women through Micro Finance Loans

This fall the Half the Sky Group is going back to its roots by re-examining the book, Half the Sky by Nicholas D. Kristof and Sheryl WuDunn, published in 2009. For October, Jennifer Jordan led a discussion of Chapter 11, "Micro Credit: the Financial Revolution" the practice under which small loans are made to individuals seeking tools and supplies to start or grow their businesses.

Over the years, working through the Kiva organization, the Elmhurst group has made a total of 36 loans to entrepreneurs in 13 countries, ranging from Guatemala, to Kenya and Pakistan. All loans were made to women; their businesses centered on such things as sewing, animals and food products. Several reports questioning the long term benefits of micro financing were discussed at the meeting.
